#### DESCRIPTION/BACKGROUND

The City owns a 13-acre parcel near NE Lovgreen Road ("M&E property")that is part of the City-owned farmland portfolio. The property was acquired by the City in 2002, using proceeds from the Open Space Bonds. The property is subject to deed restrictions and covenants that were agreed to at the time of purchase, and which affect the type of activities that can occur at the site.

The property is managed by Friends of the Farms ("FOF"), under a 2011 master lease agreement between the City and FOF.

In 2016, FOF issued an RFP to solicit proposals for use of the property. Lone Pine Farm & Studio, co-directed by Ryan Montella and Sarah Margolis Pineo, responded to the RFP and provided a proposed scope of work for the property.

FOF will provide a presentation on the Lone Pine Farm & Studio proposal, the planned use of the M&E site, and the proposed general provision for the potential sublease.

If the City Council is supportive of this proposal, FOF will work to develop a sublease with Lone Pine Farm & Studio to cover the initial 3-year term.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit the attached Scope of Work, which was received in response to an RFP issued by Friends of the Farms in late 2016 for the publicly owned farmland parcels known as M&E East and West.

The 13 acre M&E property is a unique Bainbridge Island treasure. It has a rolling topography, rich mixed vegetative composition, and is a sanctuary for numerous bird and wildlife species. This diverse ecological system exists within a significant island watershed. Ryan Montella, Co-Director of Lone Pine Farm & Studio has created a holistic approach to the property through the implementation of a comprehensive management plan to increase the non-commercial agricultural, recreational, and educational viability of the land. Lone Pine will serve as an incubator to create and implement strategies to ensure a thriving agricultural presence on Bainbridge Island and beyond through community partnerships and opportunities for emerging farmers, researchers, and designers to work in-residence. Lone Pine will operate as a non-profit organization and within the Conservation Restrictions set forth in the 2003 Quit Claim Deed transferring the property to the City of Bainbridge Island.

As agricultural stewards of public farmland, we have the opportunity to not only preserve practices of the past and present (i.e. small-scale family farming operations), but also invest in strategies sustaining our agricultural future. We can protect farmland and forests alike, while fostering the next generation of stewards, versed not only in farming practices, but also in matters of public policy, advocacy, and community health and education. We can and should experiment with innovative methods of agricultural production pointed towards equitable food distribution for an expanding urban population.

Friends of the Farms is excited about the potential of Mr. Montella's proposal to preserve the unique Conservation Values of the M&E property, while creating a valued community and agricultural resource for generations to come.

#### INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

In 2016 Friends of the Farms issued an RFP for the 13.3 acres known as M&E East and West. The subject property is part of 60 acres of public farmland managed by Friends of the farms under a 30 year master lease with the City of Bainbridge Island.

In response to the RFP, a proposal was submitted by Ryan Montella, co-founder and director of Lone Pine Farm & Studio. The proposal was reviewed by the Board of Directors of Friends of the Farms and an outside panel of community members.

Friends of the Farms seeks approval from COBI to issue a sublease to Mr. Montella and Lone Pine Farm & Studio based on the following objectives and Scope of Work. The terms of the sublease will comply with the Conservation Restrictions delineated in the Quit Claim Deed conveying the property to the City of Bainbridge Island.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

The primary objectives of this sublease are to preserve, protect, and enhance City-owned farmland, support the stability and viability of agriculture on Bainbridge Island, and serve the interests of Bainbridge Island residents.

In its master lease with Friends of the Farms the City of Bainbridge Island identifies certain desired uses for the M&E property.

#### They include:

- Develop and implement a comprehensive conservation plan
- Create enhanced public access through new and enhanced trails and connectivity
- Develop educational, artistic and interpretive programs
- Create an incubator for would-be farmers to test and enhance their business plans

#### PROJECT APPROACH AND TIMELINE

Throughout the term of the 3-year initial sublease Lone Pine Farm will conduct regular maintenance, site cleanup, provide improvements to increase public access, and work in conjunction with Friends of the Farms farmland stewardship projects.

#### Phase 1

#### Site Analysis and Inventory (3 months)

In consultation with outside experts, analyze and inventory ecological assets of the property including trees, soil, water resources and wildlife habitat.

#### Phase 2

#### Zones of Use Plan (9 months)

Develop a comprehensive conservation plan that identifies the best uses for the multiple ecological zones within M&E and establishes agreed upon strategies for implementation. The plan will be submitted to and approved by the City.

#### Phase 3

#### Implementation (2 years)

Institute the comprehensive conservation plan, which includes the vegetative and public use management aspects, addressing the desired goals of the City of Bainbridge Island and ensuring the stability of the ecological systems of this unique place, while complying with the Conservation Restrictions of the Quit Claim Deed.

#### SCOPE OF WORK

#### Phase 1

- Assess site potential
- Evaluate existing soil, water, vegetation, and wildlife habitat
- Conduct topographic analysis
- Evaluate existing infrastructure
- Conduct geologic analysis
- Identify areas of biological remediation phylo and micro
- Identify native and invasive species for preservation or removal
- Map outdoor features

#### Phase 2

Create a detailed Zones of Use plan. See graphic example attached as Worksheet A.

#### Phase 3

In accordance with the accepted comprehensive conservation plan, begin developing and actively cultivating farmland based on planning work developed throughout Phases 1 and 2. Activities may include:

- Develop water catchment infrastructure, such as cisterns and constructed wetlands
- Create a bioregional food forest
- Create a growing space and educational center for beginning farmers, design students, and apprentices
- Create interpretive signage, didactics, viewpoints, and sitting spaces to enhance visitor site experience

#### TEAM

The Lone Pine Farm and & team consists of Ryan Montella and Sarah Margolis Pineo. See bios attached as Worksheet B.

#### **DIRECTOR BIOS**

RYAN MONTELLA is a designer, planner and farmer who represents the next generation of thinkers taking an integral approach to food security and policy issues surrounding the wide spectrum of challenges that face farmers today. Ryan moved to Washington in 2012 to study at Butler Green Farms on Bainbridge Island and subsequently became Project Manager. His background includes graduate studies of post-disaster resiliency with a focus on resilience engineering in agricultural systems at Yestermorrow Design/Build School in Vermont, where he worked with the community of Waitsfield, VT after Tropical Storm Irene. He has worked for various initiatives in Detroit, Michigan helping to design more resilient master plans for several non-profits. Currently he is the Co-founder & Director at Lone Pine Farm and Studio. His recent projects include La Vida Verde Center in Lo De Marcos, Mexico; Middle Field Farms on Bainbridge island; Roots and Stems Organic Flowers in San Franciso CA; and the Babcock Farm Restoration Project in Port Gamble, WA. Current projects include farm restoration for Rolling Bay Land Company, and design and implementation of a small farm on a private residence at Fort Warden.

SARAH MARGOLIS PINEO is a curator, writer, and educator -- currently, the Assistant Curator of the Frye Art Museum, (Seattle, WA). Until 2015, Sarah was Associate Curator of Museum of Contemporary Craft in partnership with Pacific Northwest College of Art, (closed, Portland, OR), where she specialized in organizing exhibitions, public programs, collaborative projects, educational opportunities, and multimedia resources that explored the interstice of contemporary craft and design. Additionally, she serves as an instructor, mentor, and guest critic to graduate students receiving their MFA degrees in Applied Craft + Design, a joint program of Oregon College of Art and Craft and Pacific Northwest College of Art. Previously, Sarah was the Jeanne and Ralph Graham Collections Fellow and Assistant Curator at Cranbrook Art Museum, (Bloomfield Hills, MI), where her exhibition, No Object Is an Island, reopened the museum following renovation and expansion. She contributes to numerous print publications and online art journals, notably: Bitch Magazine; Journal of Modern Craft; Surface Design Association Magazine; Daily Serving in partnership with Art Practical; Art21; and Bad at Sports: Contemporary Art Talk.

#### **Basic Lease Provisions Proposed for the M&E Property (May 2017)**

- 1. Term: The term of this lease shall be 3 years from the date of signing, renewable by mutual written agreement between the City and FOF for an additional term of up to 15 years.
- 2. Rent: In consideration for the benefits to the City and the public in improvements to the land provided by the Tenant, and in consideration that commercial activity is prohibited on the property, the Tenant will not be charged rent.
- 3. Use: The use of the property shall be as set forth in the Scope of Work, attached hereto. Additional uses of the property shall be only with written permission of the City. Use of the property will conform to all City regulations, zoning restrictions, and other requirements.
- 4. Sublease: The Tenant shall not sublet the property or any portion thereof without mutual written consent from the City and FOF.
- 5. Improvements: Any improvements by the Tenant shall:
  - a. Comply with the restrictions applicable to the premises in the transfer of ownership to the City, as well as the Master Lease and Management Agreement between the City and FOF.
  - b. Be approved by FOF and the City and be within the Scope of Work.
  - c. Comply with any permit requirements under City code or state or federal law.
  - d. Be temporary, unless permitted by written mutual consent of the City and FOF.
  - e. Be removed by the Tenant at such time as the lease is terminated unless the City and FOF agree in writing to retain said improvements. In the event the Tenant does not remove said improvements, FOF and the City may remove them and any cost incurred shall be paid by the Tenant.
- 6. Insurance: The Tenant shall provide insurance required the City and FOF and provide written proof thereof.
- 7. Default: In the event of any failure by the Tenant to comply with the terms of this lease, FOF and the City shall give 60 days' notice to comply or vacate the premises. If the Tenant shall fail to comply by the end of the 60 days, FOF and the City may terminate this lease.
- 8. Termination by Tenant: The Tenant may terminate this lease by giving written notice of Intent to Terminate a minimum of 180 days in advance of the date of termination. Subsequent to such notice, the Tenant shall continue to comply with all requirements of this lease.

#### INTRODUCTION

**THE SITE TODAY:** Babcock Farm is currently being used as a ranch, and from time to time is home to anywhere between 8 and 12 Long Horn Cattle. The greenhouses are currently being used by Green Valley Nursery, and are primarily used for plant start propagation. The site is in good condition has been well maintained.



ANALYSIS AND ASSESSMENT studies (A&A) are completed prior to any major design project, and especially sites with many complicated layers of information such as a farm. The critical areas that were studied included: The Climate; Landform; Water; Vegetation; and Infrastructure. Considering the important inter-relationship between these critical components, each area was surveyed in detail during multiple field inspections. Further research was done to establish base line data which inturn, will help us understand the full capability of this site. Regardless of outcomes, analysis and assessment studies are useful at all stages of development whether they be for the entire site, or particular areas.

**GOALS ARTICULATIONS** help us to understand how to use information gathered in A&A and put that information to work. They are guiding principles that shape our design process. The purpose of this project was to explore potential, and from that, design and process will lead to discoveries as the project goes on. Goals for the first stage of the design process are:

- -Establishment of a system which seeks to meet human needs while increasing ecosystem needs
- -Create a plan for soil stabilization and erosion prevention which is also productive and efficient
- -Produce a planting schedule which is bio-diverse, resilient, and profitable year-round

**CONCEPT DESIGN** is where we begin to understand potential and put it into context. Included in this plan is a conceptual design plan based on studies and research of the site. Using the goals as a foundation, the Concept Design is a long term plan for the site and can be implemented all at once, or one piece at a time. Included is a schedule for phases of development, and can assist in planning the project.






#### **Priorities:**




#### LANDFORMS / SOILS



**Priorities:** Creating a plan to mitigate erosion in the areas identified as "slumping" should be a addressed as soon as possible. There are many ways the negate this problem including building retaining walls. However taking clues from restoration projects along water ways where erosion happens quickly, planting intensively has slowed and stopped erosion, and choosing aggressive species like black locust can speed recovery of affected areas.

Constraints: Currently with autumn upon us and heavy rain, getting on site to plant can be tedious as soil can quickly erode with continuous rainfall. Availability of rootstock at this time of year may be an issue also, and delays with USDA quarantine may slow process. However, Black locust is the best choice for a project like this due to its long tern benefits as a rot resistant wood, and its ability to be coppiced and rapidly grow, and be used for various projects on site for years. Post can last up to 80 years in the ground.



#### NOTES:

An additional analysis of an existing well should be fully studied and recharge rate needs to be determined. Should the capacity be adequate for crop irrigation, impact on dry season production should be significant. Geological integrity is always a concern with old wells, as risk of collapse is greater due to uncertainty of well condition and maintenance history. Establishing water rights is a lengthy and arduous process, and time would be better used investing n rainwater catchment.



Priorities: Preparing for hot weather growing should start with setting up rainwater catchment on existing structures and establishing baseline water holding capacity for the site. Procurement of rain barrels, cisterns, and or construction of containment areas for rainwater runoff should happen as soon as possible. Containment of the water should be kept towards the key point area of the farm, and growing spaces down slope could be constructed. This would allow gravity fed irrigation, and easy, low cost production.


Constraints: Capacity will always be the issue when growing, so if experimental garden beds are set up upon successful development of a simple irrigation system to test the concept: ensure there is a careful water management system in place such as timers and heavy duty ball valves to mitigate water resource losses.






**Notes:** Grassy areas, depending on their age are typically the most productive soils on the planet. While this is certainly a young site in geological and biological time, proper management of this site has yielded Mollisol Soil - a very productive, humusrich base which is very beneficial when considering the potential capacity of an organic vegetable farm. While "prairie conditions" exist on the site, it is important to recognize there were few nitrogen fixing plants present, and concentration was low and scattered. Incorporating a 2:1 ration of Grasses to Nitrogen fixers would be ideal.


Priorities: Considering that the site has been maintained very well, assigning areas where cultivation would be ideal would be the next step. Ideally, getting into the areas deemed suitable for cultivation early next spring and cover cropping them would be a great first step. Next, addressing the area actively slumping can be mitigated with an intensive planting of Black Locust, and aggressive natives. This will be discussed later in the next section. Perimeter areas; fence lines; ditches and roadways need to continue to be maintained and although invasive are minimal, eradication should be ongoing.

Constraints: As mentioned above, the slumping are does present a challenge to that part of the parcel, but also presents an opportunity to demonstrate effective mitigatgatlon of erosion with plants normally used in Riparian zones along rivers and creeks. Again, more will be discussed later. Additionally, due to the slope of the land, entire area cannot be cultivated and tilled in because the risk of further erosion is a reality. Planning on using techniques from Agroforestry or "alley cropping"; alternating rows of cultivation with rows of orchards, bushes and ground coverage will adequately eliminated further risk; increase soil retention; increase biodiversity and lessen irrigation demand.

While there is access to 40,000 square feet of Greenhouse space, evaluation of available space for the farm use needs to be considered. Installation of temporary "hoop houses" can be utilized in the time being. Adequate rainwater collection infrastructure, I.E. Greenhouses, needs will have to be addressed because that runoff collection will likely support food production and be an integral piece of the irrigation system.

#### **Constraints:**

**Priorities:** 

A considerable, but phased investment in capital infrastructure will likely be a strategic way to incrementally increase production capacity. As noted above, Greenhousing will be key for irrigation, and water collection as Department of Environment regulations prohibit rainwater catchment in ponds or cisterns UNLESS it is derived from roof runoff.


#### NOTES:

#### **DEISGN SUMMARY/SECTOR PLAN**



#### **SECTOR 1:**

**SILVIPASTURE** 

This technique blends animals pasturing and orchard maintenance into one. With an established, but young orchard, integration of grazing animals such as goats, sheep, and cattle can provide a mutual beneficial relationship by increasing soil fertility, reducing maintenance and feed costs.

#### **SECTOR 2:**

INTERPLANTED ORCHARDS & ANNUALS

This technique will increase productivity per acre by combining annual row crops and perennials. Rows of Stone Fruits and raspberries established between garden beds help hold the hillside together, and because all cultivation is on contour, gravity slowly feeds water and nutrients downhill, virtually eliminating loss.

#### **SECTOR 3:**

**PASTURE** 

Availability of adequate pasture is critical when planning for integrating animals into cultivated areas. Either for holding, or for habitat, this area can allow animals to keep to themselves and graze, and will be out the major traffic areas, but close to access routes to allow movement around the farm.

#### SECTOR 4:

SERVICE AREA

Area for storage of water catchment, equipment, compost, and other material bays. This area is level making for a safe space for operating machinery and already has a well maintained road surface suitable for four season operations.

#### **SECTOR 6:**

VITICULTURE & BIO-REMEDIATION

This area will showcase techniques in erosion mitigation by planting grapes, Black Locust, and natives with aggressive roots systems to hold hillside together. They are both valuable and useful crops and showcase conscientious stewardship techniques.

#### **SECTOR 8:**

**BLUEBERRIES & GRAPES** 

While in the wettest area, this zone will also receive adequate solar access to rapidly grow blueberries. Planting perennials here mitigates damage that would otherwise be caused by conventional cultivation. Planting of early/mid/and late season varieties will ensure longer and profitable season. Continued Grape propagation as part of landslide mitigation and soil deterioration.

#### **SECTOR 5:**

ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS

This area can accommodate a wide variety crops and is well suited for major production given its location and solar access. Green housing will allow for 4 season production. Continuing with the theme of interplanted tree and shrub crops, flowers, and horizontally

#### SECTOR 7:

SUMMER SALAD & COOL WEATHER/HOT SEASON CROPS

Taking advantage of this micro climate; growing valuable salad greens and brassicas during peak production time without stress from heat in greenhouse and pressure to irrigate constantly saves resources.

#### **SECTOR 9:**

PROPAGATION / NURSERY

Although currently occupied, this area will serve as a vital hub for future projects including hydroponic growing, aquaponics, and could be a major source or income during the winter months producing valuable head lettuce, salad greens, and kale in containers and in raised beds. 

#### **CROSS CONTOUR**

planting programs ensure the most efficient way for water to be distributed throughout the farm; mitigates nutrient loss by interplanting orchards. perennials, and ground cover; and does not leech excess nitrates into the surrounding environment or groundwater. The advantages of the interplanted orchards and annual garden beds also increase the amount of organic matter onsite and with simple "chop and drop" techniques, humus is built up over time, thus improving the farm's vitality and lessening the workload by not having to haul around material. Further, integration of this oncontour systems slows overland flow of storm water, and with managed swales, can mitigate erosion from large rain events. Rather than retaining storm water in one place, it is spread among the entire site.

Auger Composting System by Green Mountain Industries. Approximately 30'X70'. Can aerobically produce up to 500 yards of compost a month. Uses 50% less space and can produce compost nearly 3 times faster than machine turning. This unit in use at Hey Day Farm.




#### Methane Bio-Gas Digester By Impact Bio Energy.

Anaerobic counterpart to the Auger system, this unit produces liquid compost, and methane gas. Can also produce 120V electricity. This one is in use at the Harbour Pub and is a joint project with Puget Sound Energy.

Classic Equipment bays should be employed for storage of Machinery, Compost and other assets sensitive to the environment. It is important that the bay have: a concrete floor to inhibit leeching of composts and other materials; and adequate diversion of rainwater from manures per county regulations.



#### **IRRIGATION AND COMPOST**



**Gravity Fed Irrigation Systems,** with the assistance of a pump: systems can move water throughout the farm. Taking advantage of the 17.5% slope of the farm, getting good pressure to run drip irrigation and micro emitters will not be an issue. At minimum, moderate drops in elevation will give good pressure at 10psi, and running full blast from a catchment basin can achieve 40-50+ PSI and would require the installation of pressure reducer. With a program in place, catchment basins ranging from 2,500-5000 gallons placed strategically throughout the site can ensure adequate water resources in the dry season, without relying on a well or rain dances.

#### **Phases of Development**

#### Year One:

### I. Develop rain water catchment on existing buildings:

- A. Retrofit roofs with rain gutters and downspouts
- B. Collect 55 gallon drums; 225 gal. palettes — if recycled, ensure nontoxic materials were stored, PBC free or food grade is desirable
- C. Gather 2 inch line and irrigation fittings

#### II. Prepare Annual and perennial beds:

- A. Start in Sector 5, for the ease of moving water down hill
- B. With a heavy tractor of at least 40 horsepower, run a sub-soiler through annual beds to break up compacted earth.
- C. Run a heavy disc, then smaller disc over beds.
- D. Fields will be ready for Rotovator
- E. 50% of fields with cover crop
- F. Plant other 50% with mixed varieties of annals
- G. Add hoop-houses as needed

### III. Prepare rows for fruit tree and perennials:

- A. Continue planting in Sector 5
- B. Plant Fruits trees in-line and on contour every 15 20 feet
- C. Perennial Herbs, berries, and flowers can be planted in between trees

## IV. Sector 6 Intensive Erosion Prevention Preparation:

- A. Collect root stock for Black Locust
- B. Collect root stock for Grape
- C. Pot and store in Greenhouse

#### **Year One Continued:**

### V. In Late Summer, repeat steps from section II.:

- A. Prepare site for Greenhouse Construction, and Building
- B. Repeat rainwater catchment steps from section I.
- C. Plants Raspberries between annuals bed areas
- D. Continue to plant stone fruit, apple and perennials

#### VI. Prepare Sector 8 For Cultivation:

- A. Repeat steps from parts II.
- B. Sow winter cover crop of Vetch and Rye

### VIII. Prepare planted beds and greenhouses for over wintering:

A. Cover frost intolerant plants with Row cover, either Remay or Plastic

### I. Prepare Sector six for planting of grapes, black locust, and natives:

- contour to the north, and stagger planting every 12 feet, space rows 12 feet apart
- C. Plant natives at a high density throughout tree stand
- D. Between rows, prepare beds as noted above and sow perennial clover and mustards as row cover

#### II. Establish Blueberry Patch:

- A. Layout rows on contour at least every 8 feet.
- B. Soil Area, remove as much sod as possible
- C. Plant blueberries every 3 to 4 feet
- D. Between rows, cultivate beds for perennial cover crop as explained above

### III. Establish orchard for Silvipasture area in Sector 4:

- A. Layout tree rows on contour
- B. Tree rows should be spaced a minimum of 15 feet apart
- C. Sub soil area, and disc as noted before. Skip rotation step
- D. Plant tress 15-20 feet apart
- E. Cultivate area in-between tree rows: sub soil, disc, roto-vate and seed ares will alfalfas, clovers, rye, and other beneficial animal fodder
- F. Continue to develop rain catchment and irrigation infrastructure

- A. Follow all steps as noted above for annual garden cultivation
- B. Ensure adequate water availability for summer production

#### **Year Three:**

### I. Develop site for Onsite Composting Infrastructure:

- A. Contact Aveterra Industries for Auger Composting equipment from Green Mountain Energies
- B. Build bays for material and equipment storage
- C. Obtain Methane Bio-Gas Digester from Impact Bio Energy

## II. Continue to Improve all areas of site: planting maintenance and infrastructure, add Photovoltaic units

### III. Begin to Integrate technologies to extend seasons:

- A. Use methane from Bio-gas digester to heat green houses in winter
- B. Solar equipment to run fans and pumps in summer
- IV. Begin to integrate animals in areas to maintain cover crop and fertilize all areas: ducks, chickens, geese, dwarf goats, sheep etc.

#### **Outcomes:**

While the hobby farmer could develop this plan in the span of a decade; real return on investment will come by working with an experienced professional through all stages of this project and development phases. Following the design guidelines will certainly yield large amounts of produce, but in order to get there takes expert management throughout the entire lifespan of the farm — especially in the early years. Additionally, if managed properly, the embodied energy to produce crops should steadily drop year after year, and return on investments should increase over time steadily.

This QUIT CLAIM DEED WITH CONSERVATION RESTRICTIONS ("Deed") is entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of December, 2002, by and between ELIZABETH RICE GROSSMAN, a married woman, who acquired title as Elizabeth Rice Larson, and her husband A. RICHARD GROSSMAN, and JOHN W. LARSON, a single man, and his wife SASHA LARSON (collectively, "Grantor"), and the CITY OF BAINBRIDGE ISLAND, a Washington municipal corporation (the "City" or "Grantee").

#### **ŘECITALS**

- A. Grantor is the owner in fee simple of that certain real property located in Bainbridge Island, Kitsap County, Washington, the legal description of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated negative by this reference (the "Property").
- B. The Property consists of approximately 5 acres of open space and timber land and is classified as a seasonal watershed area. The Property possesses natural scenic, open space, agricultural, wildlife habitat, and outdoor recreation values (collectively, the "Conservation Values") of great importance to Grantor, the City, and the people of the State of Washington.
- As provided in RCW 84.34.200, the Washington State Legislature has found that the haphazard growth and spread of urban development is encroaching upon, or eliminating, numerous open space areas, lands devoted to agriculture and the cultivation and timber, and other areas

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having significant recreational, social, scenic, and aesthetic values. Accordingly, under RCW 84.34.210, the Legislature has authorized cities to acquire by purchase, gift, or otherwise, the fee simple or any lesser interest, development right, easement, covenant, or other contractual right necessary to protect, preserve, maintain, improve, restore, limit the future use of, or otherwise conserve selected open space land, farm and agricultural land, and timber land for public use or enjoyment.

- On November 6, 2001, the voters of Bainbridge Island approved a bond measure D. authorizing the City to acquire and preserve forested areas, open space, wildlife habitat, farms, and agricultural lands in accordance with Ordinance No. 2001-36. The City has established an Open Space Commission pursuant to Ordinance No. 2001-36 and Resolution 2001-48 to identify prioritize, and recommend properties for acquisition and preservation. On December 21, 2002, the Open Space Commission recommended that the City acquire the Property for conservation purposes.
- Grantor desires to place certain conservation restrictions on the Property to protect and preserve in perpetuity the Conservation Values of the Property and then donate the Property to the City and the City desires to accept the gift of the Property with such conservation restrictions.

#### CONSERVATION RESTRICTIONS

Grantor declares that the Property shall be held, conveyed, used, and improved subject to the following covenants, conditions, and restrictions:

- Conservation Restrictions (The Property shall be subject to the following 1. development and use restrictions (the "Conservation Restrictions") in order to preserve and protect in perpetuity the Conservation Values of the Property
- <u>Development Restrictions</u>. The placement or construction of improvements on the Property is prohibited including, without limitation, roads, parking lots, buildings, structures, septic systems, and utilities, except as necessary to preserve or protect the Conservation Values of the Property or as specifically allowed in Section 2 of this Deed.
- Use Restrictions. Any use of, or activity on, the Property that significantly impairs or interferes with the Conservation Values of the Property is prohibited. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the following uses of, or activities on or related to, the Property, though not an exhaustive list, are prohibited, except as specifically allowed in Section 2 of this Deed:

Subdivision. The legal or "de facto" division, subdivision, or partitioning of the Property, which shall include, but not be limited to, any subdivision, short subdivision, platting, binding site plan, or other process by which the Property is divided into lots or separate parcels.

- Commercial Agricultural Activities. The commercial harvesting, cutting, or destruction of timber or other vegetation on the Property.
- Alteration of Land. The alteration of the surface of the land. including, without limitation, the excavation or removal of soil, sand, gravel, rock, peat, or sod, except as necessary to preserve or protect the Conservation Values of the Property.
- iv. Erosion or Water Pollution. Any use or activity that causes or is likely to cause significant soil degradation or erosion or significant pollution of any surface or subsurface waters.
- Waste Disposal. The disposal or storage of rubbish, garbage, ٧. debris, vehicles, equipment, or other unsightly, offensive, or hazardous waste or material on the Property; provided, that rubbish, garbage, and debris can be stered in proper containers for subsequent disposal.
- Vİ. Mining. The exploration for, or development and extraction of. minerals, hydrocarbons or other materials on or below the surface of the Property.
- Allowed Development and Uses. The following development and uses shall be 2. permitted on the Property and shall not be prohibited by the Conservation Restrictions:
- Fencing. Fencing is allowed only as reasonably necessary to preserve and protect the Conservation Values of the Property.
- Pedestrian Trails Pedestrian trails for outdoor recreational use may be constructed, maintained, and repaired on the Property.
- Restroom Facility. A restroom facility appropriate to facilitate the public's use and enjoyment of the Property as natural open space may be constructed on the Property; provided, that such restroom facility shall not unduly interfere with the Conservation Values of the Property.
- Maintenance and Repair of Existing Structures. Structures existing on the Property on the date of this Deed may be maintained or repaired, but may not be expanded, except as necessary to protect and preserve the Conservation Values of the Property.
- Vegetation Management. The pruning, cutting down or other destruction or removal of trees or other vegetation in accordance with sound conservation management practices is allowed on the Property where necessary to control or prevent hazard, disease, fire, or the spread of invasive plants or to establish or enhance wildlife habitats.

- Effective Date. The effective date of the Conservation Restrictions shall be the date on which this Deed is recorded in the official records of Kitsap County.
- Controlling Law The laws of the State of Washington shall govern the interpretation of this Deed and the Conservation Restrictions. Any general rule of construction to the contrary notwithstanding, the Conservation Restrictions shall be liberally construed to effect the purpose of the Conservation Restrictions and the policy and purpose of Chapter 84.34 RCW. If any provision in this Deed is found to be ambiguous, such provision shall be interpreted consistent with the purpose of the Conservation Restrictions to protect and preserve in perpetuity the Conservation Values of the Property to the maximum extent legally permissible.
- Severability. If any provision of this Deed, or its application to any person or circumstance, is found to be invalid, the remaining provisions of this Deed, or the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is found to be invalid, as the case may be, shall not be affected.



This QUIT CLAIM DEED WITH CONSERVATION RESTRICTIONS ("Deed") is entered into day of December, 2002, by and between ELIZABETH RICE GROSSMAN, a married woman, who acquired title as Elizabeth Rice Larson, and her husband A. RICHARD GROSSMAN (collectively, "Grantor"), and the CITY OF BAINBRIDGE ISLAND, a Washington municipal corporation (the "City" or "Grantee").

#### RECITALS

Grantor is the owner in fee simple of that certain real property located in Bainbridge Island, Kitsap County, Washington, the Jegal description of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Property").

The Property consists of approximately 8.25 acres of open space and timber land and is classified as a seasonal watershed area. The Property possesses natural scenic, open space, agricultural, wildlife habitat, and outdoor recreation values (collectively, the "Conservation Values") of great importance to Grantor, the City, and the people of the State of Washington.

As provided in RCW 84.34.200, the Washington State Legislature has found that the haphazard growth and spread of urban development is encroaching upon, or eliminating, numerous open space areas, lands devoted to agriculture and the cultivation and timber, and other areas having significant recreational, social, scenic, and aesthetic values. Accordingly, under RCW 84.34.210, the Legislature has authorized cities to acquire by purchase, gift, or otherwise, the fee

simple or any lesser interest, development right, easement, covenant, or other contractual right necessary to protect, preserve, maintain, improve, restore, limit the future use of, or otherwise conserve selected open space land, farm and agricultural land, and timber land for public use or enjoyment.

D. On November 6, 2001, the voters of Bainbridge Island approved a bond measure authorizing the City to acquire and preserve forested areas, open space, wildlife habitat, farms, and agricultural lands in accordance with Ordinance No. 2001-36. The City has established an Open Space Commission pursuant to Ordinance No. 2001-36 and Resolution 2001-48 to identify, prioritize, and recommend properties for acquisition and preservation. On December 21, 2002, the Open Space Commission recommended that the City acquire the Property for conservation purposes.

E. Grantor desires to place certain conservation restrictions on the Property to protect and preserve in perpetuity the Conservation Values of the Property and then donate the Property to the City and the City desires to accept the gift of the Property with such conservation restrictions.

#### CONSERVATION RESTRICTIONS

Grantor declares that the Property shall be held, conveyed, used, and improved subject to the following covenants, conditions, and restrictions:

1. <u>Conservation Restrictions</u> The Property shall be subject to the following development and use restrictions (the "Conservation Restrictions") in order to preserve and protect in perpetuity the Conservation Values of the Property.

a. <u>Development Restrictions</u>. The placement or construction of improvements on the Property is prohibited, including, without limitation, roads, parking lots, buildings, structures, septic systems, and utilities, except as necessary to preserve or protect the Conservation Values of the Property or as specifically (allowed in Section 2 of this Deed.

b. <u>Use Restrictions</u>. Any use of, or activity on, the Property that significantly impairs or interferes with the Conservation Values of the Property is prohibited. THIS DECLARATION OF MUTUAL SHADE COVENANT (this "Declaration") is made this 27 day of December, 2004 by Gerard Bentryn and Josephine A. Bentryn, husband and wife (collectively, "Bentryn") for the benefit of the City of Bainbridge Island, Washington (the "City") and by the City of Bainbridge Island, Washington, for the benefit of Gerard Bentryn and Josephine A. Bentryn.

### RECITALS

- A. Bentryn is the owner of certain agricultural real property located in Bainbridge Island, Kitsap County, Washington, as legally described on Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated by this reference trespectively, the Retained Property" and the "Residential Property", and collectively called the "Bentryn Property").
- B. The City is the owner of and/or has an interest in certain agricultural real property located in Bainbridge Island, Kitsap County, Washington, as legally described on **Exhibit B**, attached hereto and incorporated by this reference (respectively, the "Agricultural Property", the "Suvernatsu Property", the "Crawford Property" and the "M&E" Property, and collectively called the "City Property").
- C. The Bentryn Property and the City Property are immediately adjacent to each other, and certain activities conducted upon either of these properties have the potential to adversely impact the agricultural activities upon the other property.
- D. The parties are mutually concerned about the impact that the shadows cast by trees and vegetation would have upon the agricultural activities of the other property. It is therefore their desire to establish a shade covenant for the benefit of their respective properties.

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PACIFIC NW TITLE

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NOW THEREFORE, Bentryn declares for the benefit of the Agricultural Property and Suyematsu Property, and the City declares for the benefit of the Retained and Residential Property, that the parties' respective properties are hereby made subject to, and shall be held, conveyed and occupied subject to the covenants, conditions, and restrictions set forth herein:

### 1. Shade Covenant.

- assigns, covenant and agree that Bentryn, at Bentryn's sole cost and expense, shall reasonably maintain the Bentryn Property in such a manner as to prevent the creation of "shade shadows" upon the Agricultural and Suyematsu Properties which have the potential to impact the agricultural activities conducted upon the Agricultural and Suyematsu Properties, as such activities may be conducted from time to time by the City in the City's sole discretion. The City's failure to use the Agricultural and/or Suyematsu Property for agricultural purposes for any period of time shall not constitute a waiver of the covenants set forth herein.
- 1.2 City. The City, for itself and its successors, heirs and assigns, covenants and agrees that the City, at the City's sole cost and expense, shall reasonably maintain the Crawford and/or M&E Properties in such a manner as to prevent the creation of "shade shadows" upon the Bentryn Property which have the potential to impact the agricultural activities conducted upon the Bentryn Property, as such activities may be conducted from time to time by Bentryn in Bentryn's sole discretion. In particular, the City shall not permit trees and vegetation located within one hundred (100) feet of the northern boundary lines of the Crawford and M&E Properties to grow higher than thirty (30) feet, without the express written consent of Bentryn. Bentryn's failure to use the Bentryn Property for agricultural purposes for any period of time shall not constitute a waiver of the covenants set forth herein.
- 2. Standards Governing Covenant. Whether an alleged shade shadow "adversely impacts" the agricultural activities conducted upon the adjoining property shall be measured in accordance with general agricultural standards, taking into account the particular agricultural activities allegedly adversely impacted and the normal amount of sunlight generally accepted as necessary to produce the crop at issue. The covenants set forth herein are not intended to guarantee the best amount of sunlight available, but only that amount of sunlight that is reasonably necessary to conduct the agricultural activities upon the respective properties.
- 3. Notice of Violation/Good Faith Negotiations. If either party in good faith believes that the other party is in violation of the covenants and conditions set forth in this Declaration, that party (the "Complainant") shall deliver to the other party (the "Recipient") written notice of the alleged violation, which notice shall include a description of the alleged violation and a proposed course of action for curing such alleged violation. If the Recipient

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concurs with the notice, the Recipient shall notify the Complainant of such within 15 days of delivery of the notice and thereafter shall in good faith take such reasonable measures to cure the identified violation to the reasonable satisfaction of the Complainant as soon as reasonably practical and possible. If the Recipient disputes the violation or otherwise disagrees with the cure proposed by the Complainant, the Recipient shall notify the Complainant in writing of such dispute within 15 days of the delivery of the notice. Within a reasonable time after the Recipient's delivery of the notice of dispute, the parties shall meet and shall in good faith endeavor to negotiate a resolution to the issues raised by the Complainant's notice. If, within 45 days following the Complainant's delivery to the Recipient of the notice of violation, the parties have not reached a resolution of the issues identified by the Complainant, the Complainant may pursue any remedies available to Claimant at law or in equity.

- 4. Governing Law: This Declaration shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington. Venue for any dispute arising hereunder shall be Kitsap County, Washington
- 5. Attorney's Fees: In the event that any party brings suit or other proceeding with respect to the subject matter or enforcement of this Declaration, the substantially prevailing party (as determined by the court, agency or other authority before which such suit or proceeding is commenced) shall, in addition to such other relief as may be awarded, be entitled to recover attorney's fees, expenses and costs as actually incurred as a result of such litigation or proceeding (including without limitation, court costs, expert witness fees, costs and expenses of litigation, and any and all attorney's fees, costs and expenses incurred in such suit or proceeding).



### DESCRIPTION/BACKGROUND

During the calendar year, staff provides detail on budget adjustments for Council approval. Attached for Council's consideration is an ordinance with first quarter budget amendments.

The following eight amendments are proposed:

- Wyatt Way Water Line. This item amends the CIP and increases the Wyatt Way Reconstruction Project budget by \$150,000 to a total of \$3,850,000 (\$150,000 new funding from the Water Fund; \$3,700,000 existing funding from grants and City General Fund). The additional funding will provide for a water main replacement project to replace and upsize approximately 500 lineal feet of 6-inch asbestos cement pipe with 8-inch ductile iron in Wyatt Way from Lovell to Nicholson Place.
- State Route 305/Olympic Drive Water Line. This item amends the CIP and increases the SR 305/Olympic Way project by \$75,000 to a total of \$175,000 for the Water Fund. The additional funding will provide for improved water service and upgraded fire flow in this area.
- Police Vehicle Replacement. This item amends the CIP and provides funding for an additional police vehicle in 2017. A police vehicle was severely damaged in an accident in which the driver of the other vehicle did not have insurance.
- Re-decking Waterfront Park Bridge. This item provides appropriation authority for the re-decking and
  rail replacement of the Waterfront Park Pedestrian Bridge. Replacement of this bridge was budgeting
  in previous years, but was not completed due to the higher than expected costs. The 2017 repair will
  make major repairs to the bridge's surface, railings, and lighting.
- Madrona Townhomes Sewer Agreement. This item transfers appropriation authority from the
  operating to the capital budget of the Sewer Fund and amends the CIP to add a new project budgeted
  at \$135,000. The Madrona Townhomes subdivision will require improvements to the City sewer
  system from Madrona Lane through Henshaw Place to Madison Ave. The agreement will provide

- authority to construct the new sewer collection system and provide the basis for the sharing of costs.
- Housing Resources Bainbridge Property Management. This item provides appropriation authority and additional funding of \$6,000 for property management services not anticipated during budget development. Housing Resources Bainbridge (HRB) will continue to provide services as they have done in the past.
- Public Art "Something New." This item provides appropriation authority from the Public Art Subfund, as approved by Council on February 7. This funding supports conceptual development of a new public art program called "Something New," which would provide a rotating display of new public art in the Winslow area. This item increases spending by \$500 in 2017.
- Janitorial Services Agreement for City Facilities. This agreement is for janitorial services for Cityowned facilities. A 2017 budget amendment is required due to the proposed increase in frequency and scope of services at City facilities. The increase of \$40,000 brings the total budgeted spending to \$115,000.
- Fueling System Design/Upgrade. This item transfers appropriation authority related to the Fueling System Design/Upgrade from the General Fund to the Capital Construction Fund due to the nature of the project. Total budgeted spending does not change.
- Emergency AM Radio Station. This item transfers appropriation authority related to the Emergency AM Radio Station from the General Fund to the Capital Construction Fund due to the nature of the project. Total budgeted spending does not change.

#### DESCRIPTION/BACKGROUND

As part of the update to the City's Comprehensive Plan, the City Council identified "implementing actions" within each element (chapter) of the Comprehensive Plan. The Comprehensive Plan assigns a priority to each item (High, Medium or Other). Many of the implementing actions have been assigned a "High" priority.

At their April 18 meeting, the City Council reviewed a document (attached) that showed the implementing actions grouped by topic clusters ("Code Consistency/Process Improvement," "Affordable Housing," "Sustainability/Water Resources," "Economic Development," "Transportation," "Utility Planning," and "Human Services"), including information on work program responsibilities/resources and proposed project start/end dates. At the April 18 meeting, the Council provided staff direction as to their priorities for implementing the Comprehensive Plan. To better visualize those priorities, staff has drafted a 2017-2018 work program (the next 12 months) illustrating the planning process (legislative actions, staff work, consultant or committee work, Planning Commission, and City Council) and estimated timelines for the each project.

In addition to the draft 2017-2018 Comprehensive Plan Implementation Schedule/Work Program, attached is a draft Planning Commission schedule through June 2018. The schedule will shift over the next year, as some projects may take more or less time than estimated for preliminary work and review by the Planning Commission and City Council.

Staff would like confirmation from the City Council that the Implementation Schedule/Work Program

correctly reflects Council priorities.

### **Experience Summary**

Mr. Shulock is the Principal Consultant for Bainbridge Structures Group with over 40 years of national and international experience in civil, structural and transportation engineering. Previous to this he was Sr. Vice President for Hatch Mott MacDonald (HMM) serving from 2002 to 2013 as the North American Practice Leader for Highways, Bridges and Alternative Procurement. He is a recognized expert in the delivery of large transportation infrastructure projects that utilize alternative procurement e.g. Design-Build and Public Private Partnerships and the planning, design and construction of complex bridge structures including cable supported, moveable and segmental bridges.

Mr. Shulock has presented numerous talks, technical papers and design workshops at National and International Conferences, Universities and State Departments of Transportation including giving the Chairman's Lecture at the AASHTO Annual Meeting lecturing on "Creating Structural Art with Everyday Bridges", lecturing on the "Dynamics of Transportation Infrastructure Systems" for the Harvard School of Engineering's 2011 Lecture Series.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 2017-05**

**AN ORDINANCE** of the City of Bainbridge Island, Washington, amending the title of Chapter 12.28 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code and Sections 12.28.010, 12.28.020, and 12.28.025 of that chapter to reference Current Planned Facilities Maps in the Non-Motorized Chapter of the Island-Wide Transportation Plan.

**WHEREAS**, the City has an Island-Wide Transportation Plan ("IWTP") which identifies transportation needs, develops level of service standards, provides recommendations on major transportation needs, and supports the implementation of the City's transportation goals and policies in the Transportation Element of the City's Comprehensive Plan; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council updated the IWTP in February 2017 as part of the Council's Comprehensive Plan update process, and the IWTP is included as part of the Transportation Element of the Comprehensive Plan; and

**WHEREAS**, the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code needs to be updated to reference current planned facilities maps in the Non-Motorized Chapter of the Island-Wide Transportation Plan; now therefore,

### THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAINBRIDGE ISLAND, WASHINGTON, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** The title of Chapter 12.28 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

### Chapter 12.28 COMPREHENSIVE SIDEWALK PLAN

**Section 2.** Section 12.28.010 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 12.28.010 Maps adopted.

That certain map labeled "Comprehensive Sidewalk Plan," dated June 1984, a copy of which has been on file The non-motorized system plan maps in the office of the Island-Wide Transportation Plan, adopted by reference in the city's comprehensive plan, designate non-motorized facilities for city elerk for use and examination by the public, is streets. Those non-motorized system plan maps are adopted by reference herein as the city's comprehensive sidewalk non-motorized system plan.

**Section 3.** Section 12.28.020 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 12.28.020 Sidewalk required – Exception.

All projects requiring a building permit and located on property abutting any proposed sidewalk as shown on the comprehensive sidewalk plan or as required by Chapter 12.36 BIMC shall provide sidewalks and curbs along the street front in accordance with the Island-Wide Transportation Plan, including the non-motorized system plan maps included in that plan. Such sidewalk construction shall meet the approval of the city engineer and shall provide appropriate curb crossings for vehicular ingress and egress; provided, that this section shall not apply to minor remodeling or repair which does not increase the size or the area of structure. existing on June 1, 1984.

**Section 4.** Section 12.28.025 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 12.28.025 Deferral of construction authorized.

Installation of any of the improvements herein required may be deferred if the land use administrator determines that the abutting street grade cannot be established at the time of proposed construction or that existing curb and sidewalks are adequate to serve the development in question. In either case the owner of the abutting property shall execute a covenant in a form approved by the city which runs with the land being developed and which provides for installation of sidewalks and other street improvement improvements at a specified later date. The covenant shall provide that the improvements shall be installed to city standards when any one of the following first occurs:

- A. The grade of the abutting street is established;
- B. The abutting street is improved through an LID, ULID, or other funding method;
- C. Similar improvements are constructed on adjacent property; or
- D. When existing sidewalks and/or curbs are inadequate in the opinion of as determined by the city engineer.

**Section 5.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force five (5) days from its approval and publication as required by law.

#### DESCRIPTION/BACKGROUND

The City collects lodging tax revenues within its "Civic Improvement Fund." These use of these funds is governed by Chapter 67.28 RCW. The City's Municipal Code (BIMC 3.65.040) references Chapter 67.28 but also currently contains additional restrictions regarding eligible uses of these funds that no longer matches revisions made to Chapter 67.28 RCW. This update to the BIMC proposes to remove the additional restrictions and to simplify the reference to Chapter 67.28 RCW.

The restriction at issue in the current version of BIMC 3.65.040 was designed to encourage the use of the lodging funds for capital projects, as follows:

No more than one-half of the taxes collected under this chapter shall be used to pay for advertising, publicizing or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting visitors and encouraging tourist expansion unless an exception is approved by a vote of a majority of all council members plus one more vote.

For several years, this requirement has been difficult to meet. As a result, the City Council has consistently waived the requirement every year since 2010.

Additionally, in 2013, Chapter 67.28 RCW changed so that lodging tax revenues that are used to support the operations and capital expenditures of tourism-related facilities can only be used by the City for such facilities owned or operated by a municipality or a public facilities district, and this change in state law further decreases the likelihood that the restriction related to non-capital expenditures that has existed in BIMC 3.65.040 will be met going forward.

The attached ordinance proposes to modify BIMC 3.65.040 to simplify the reference to Chapter 67.28 RCW and to remove the restriction related to a fifty percent limit on non-capital expenditures.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 2017-12**

**AN ORDINANCE** of the City of Bainbridge Island, Washington, relating to the Civic Improvement Fund and amending Section 3.65.040 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code.

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bainbridge Island ("City") collects lodging tax revenues within its "Civic Improvement Fund," as set forth in Section 3.65.040 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code (BIMC), and pursuant to the state law lodging tax statute, Chapter 67.28 RCW; and

**WHEREAS**, Chapter 67.28 RCW has been revised subsequent to the last revision of BIMC 3.65.040, and BIMC 3.65.040 needs to be updated to better align with Chapter 67.28 RCW; and

**WHEREAS**, BIMC 3.65.040 also currently includes a provision that is designed to encourage the use of lodging tax funds for capital projects, as follows:

No more than one-half of the taxes collected under this chapter shall be used to pay for advertising, publicizing or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting visitors and encouraging tourist expansion unless an exception is approved by a vote of a majority of all council members plus one more vote.

**WHEREAS**, for several years this requirement has been difficult to meet and, as a result, the City Council has consistently waived the requirement every year since 2010; and

WHEREAS, in 2013, Chapter 67.28 RCW was revised so that lodging tax revenues that are used to support the operations and capital expenditures of tourism-related facilities can only be used by the City for such facilities owned or operated by a municipality or a public facilities district, and this change in state law further decreases the likelihood that the restriction that has been included in BIMC 3.65.040 related to non-capital expenditures will be met going forward; and

**WHEREAS**, the updates included herein to BIMC 3.65.040 simplify the reference to Chapter 67.28 RCW and remove the restriction related to a fifty percent limit on non-capital expenditures; and

### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAINBRIDGE ISLAND, WASHINGTON, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** Section 3.65.040 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 3.65.040 Civic improvement fund.

There is created a special fund in the treasury of the city, to be known as the "civic improvement fund." All taxes collected under this chapter shall be placed in the fund (1) to pay for all or any part of the cost of acquisition, construction, or operation of stadium facilities, convention center facilities, performing arts center facilities, and/or visual arts center facilities, or any other such facilities; (2) to pay or secure the payment of all or any portion of the general obligation bonds or revenue bonds issued for such purposes, or and shall be used for purposes provided for in Chapter 67.28 RCW, and any amendments thereto; (3) to pay for advertising, publicizing, or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting visitors and encouraging tourist expansion; or (4) to pay for such other uses as may from time to time be authorized for the taxes pursuant to statute. No more than one-half of the taxes collected under this chapter shall be used to pay for advertising, publicizing or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting visitors and encouraging tourist expansion unless an exception is approved by a vote of a majority of all council members plus one more vote. Pursuant to Chapter 67.28 RCW, including RCW 67.28.1817, the city council shall appoint a lodging tax advisory committee to advise the city council on the use of the city's civic improvement funds.

**Section 2.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force five (5) days from its passage and publication as required by law.

#### AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

This Amendment No. 2 to the Agreement for Professional Services ("Amendment"), between the City of Bainbridge Island ("City"), and Coates Design Inc. ("Consultant"), amends that certain Agreement for Professional Services, dated November 2, 2016, between the City and the Consultant, as amended by Amendment No. 1 to Agreement for Professional Services, which was executed on March 24, 2017 ("Agreement").

**WHEREAS**, the City and the Consultant entered into the Agreement to provide professional and architectural services for a proposed new police station and municipal court; and

#### DESCRIPTION/BACKGROUND

The McDonald Creek Culvert project is located at the Eagle Harbor Drive and McDonald Creek intersection. The project provides for repair of the existing deteriorated concrete culvert.

The existing Eagle Harbor Drive crossing consists of a 24-inch diameter concrete culvert, approximately 180' long and 24' deep. In the City's 2016 Island-Wide Deep Culvert Assessment Report, the McDonald Creek culvert was identified as needing to be replaced. Large longitudinal cracking along the top of the culvert and sections of misaligned pipe contributed to its "critical" overall rating. The fish habitat in McDonald Creek at this location is rated low with no fish species mapped.

#### I. Project Description

The City of Bainbridge Island (COBI) is soliciting proposals from qualified firms, or partnership of firms, with municipal public works roadway and storm water design experience to provide permitting and design services for the McDonald Creek Culvert Replacement (at Eagle Harbor Dr.) project.

#### II. Background

The existing Eagle Harbor Dr. crossing consists of a 24-inch diameter concrete culvert, approximately 180-feet long and 24-feet deep. **THIS AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES** ("Agreement") is entered into between the City of Bainbridge Island, a Washington state municipal corporation ("City"), and Reid Middleton, Inc., a Washington corporation ("Consultant").

**WHEREAS**, the City needs professional services in connection with the McDonald Creek Culvert Replacement at Eagle Harbor Drive.

**WHEREAS**, the Consultant has the expertise and experience to provide said services and is willing to do so in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions, promises, and agreements set forth herein, it is agreed by and between the City and the Consultant as follows:

#### 1. SERVICES BY CONSULTANT

The Consultant shall provide the professional services as defined in this Agreement and as necessary to accomplish the scope of services attached hereto as Attachment A and incorporated herein by this reference as if set forth in full. The Consultant shall furnish all services, labor, and related equipment to conduct and complete the work, except as specifically noted otherwise in this Agreement.

#### 2. TERM AND TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

- D. If the services rendered do not meet the requirements of this Agreement, the Consultant shall correct or modify the work to comply with this Agreement. The City may withhold payment for such work until it meets the requirements of this Agreement.

#### 4. INSPECTION AND AUDIT

The Consultant shall maintain all books, records, documents, and other evidence pertaining to the costs and expenses allowable under this Agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices. All such books and records required to be maintained by this Agreement shall be subject to inspection and audit by representatives of the City and/or the Washington State Auditor at all reasonable times, and the Consultant shall afford the proper facilities for such inspection and audit. - D. The Consultant shall obtain a business license and, if applicable, pay business and occupation taxes pursuant to Title 5 of the Bainbridge Island Municipal Code.

#### 6. NONDISCRIMINATION AND COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

- A. The Consultant agrees not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment or any other person in the performance of this Agreement because of race, creed, color, national origin, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, age, disability, or other circumstance prohibited by federal, state or local law or ordinance, except for a bona fide occupational qualification.
- B. The Consultant shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws and ordinances applicable to the work to be done under this Agreement.
- C. Violation of this Section 6 shall be a material breach of this Agreement and grounds for cancellation, termination or suspension by the City, in whole or in part, and may result in ineligibility for further work for the City.

#### 7. OWNERSHIP OF WORK PRODUCT

All data, materials, reports, memoranda, and other documents developed under this Agreement, whether finished or not, shall become the property of the City and shall be forwarded to the City in hard copy and in digital format that is compatible with the City's computer software programs.

#### 8. GENERAL ADMINISTRATION AND MANAGEMENT

The City Manager of the City, or designee, shall be the City's representative, and shall oversee and approve all services to be performed, coordinate all communications, and review and approve all invoices, under this Agreement.

#### 9. HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNIFICATION

- A. The Consultant shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, injuries, damages, losses, or suits including attorney fees, arising out of or resulting from the acts, errors, or omissions of the Consultant in performance of this Agreement, except for injuries and damages caused by the sole negligence of the City.
- B. Should a court of competent jurisdiction determine that this Agreement is subject to RCW 4.24.115, then, in the event of liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damages to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of the Consultant and the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers, the Consultant's liability, including the duty and cost to defend hereunder, shall be only to the extent of the Consultant's negligence. It is further specifically and expressly understood that the indemnification provided

herein constitutes the Consultant's waiver of immunity under Industrial Insurance, Title 51 RCW, solely for the purposes of this indemnification. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

- C. The City's inspection and acceptance of any of the Consultant's work when completed shall not be grounds to void, nullify, and/or invalidate any of these covenants of indemnification.

## ATTACHMENT A SCOPE OF SERVICES

### ATTACHMENT B INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

#### A. Insurance Term

The Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Consultant, its agents, representatives, or employees.

#### B. No Limitation

The Consultant's maintenance of insurance as required by the Agreement shall not be construed to limit the liability of the Consultant to the coverage provided by such insurance, or otherwise limit the City's recourse to any remedy available at law or in equity.

#### C. Minimum Scope of Insurance

The Consultant shall obtain insurance of the types and coverage described below:

- 1. <u>Automobile Liability</u> insurance covering all owned, non-owned, hired, and leased vehicles. Coverage shall be written on Insurance Services Office (ISO) form CA 00 01 or a substitute form providing equivalent liability coverage.
- 2. Commercial General Liability insurance shall be at least as broad as ISO occurrence form CG 00 01 and shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, stop-gap liability, independent contractors, and personal injury and advertising injury. The City shall be named as an additional insured under the Consultant's Commercial General Liability insurance policy with respect to the work performed for the City using an additional insured endorsement at least as broad as ISO CG 20 26.
- 3. <u>Workers' Compensation</u> coverage as required by the Industrial Insurance laws of the State of Washington.
- 4. Professional Liability insurance appropriate to the Consultant's profession.

#### D. Minimum Amounts of Insurance

The Consultant shall maintain the following insurance limits:

- 1. <u>Automobile Liability</u> insurance with a minimum combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage of \$1,000,000 per accident.
- 2. <u>Commercial General Liability</u> insurance shall be written with limits no less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence, \$2,000,000 general aggregate.

3. <u>Professional Liability</u> insurance shall be written with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$1,000,000 policy aggregate limit, as applicable.

#### E. Other Insurance Provision

The Consultant's Automobile Liability and Commercial General Liability insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, that they shall be primary insurance as respect the City. Any insurance, self-insurance, or self-insured pool coverage maintained by the City shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

#### F. Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best rating of not less than A:VII.

#### **G.** Verification of Coverage

Before commencing work and services, the Consultant shall provide to the person identified in Section 8 of the Agreement a Certificate of Insurance evidencing the required insurance. The Consultant shall furnish the City with original certificates and a copy of the amendatory endorsements, including but not necessarily limited to the additional insured endorsement, evidencing the insurance requirements of the Consultant before commencement of the work. The City reserves the right to request and receive a certified copy of all required insurance policies.

#### H. Notice of Cancellation

The Consultant shall provide the City with written notice of any policy cancellation within two business days of their receipt of such notice.

#### I. Failure to Maintain Insurance

Failure on the part of the Consultant to maintain the insurance as required shall constitute a material breach of contract, upon which the City may, after giving five (5) business days' notice to the Consultant to correct the breach, immediately terminate this Agreement or, at its discretion, procure or renew such insurance and pay any and all premiums in connection therewith, with any sums so expended to be repaid to the City on demand, or at the sole discretion of the City, offset against funds due the Consultant from the City.

#### J. City Full Availability of Consultant Limits

If the Consultant maintains higher insurance limits than the minimums shown above, the City shall be insured for the full available limits of Commercial General and Excess or Umbrella liability maintained by the Consultant, irrespective of whether such limits maintained by the Consultant are greater than those required by this Agreement or whether any certificate of insurance furnished to the City evidences limits of liability lower than those maintained by the Consultant.

#### INTRODUCTION

GeoEngineers, Inc. (GeoEngineers) is pleased to submit this proposal Reid Middleton, Inc. (Reid Middleton) to provide biological and geotechnical engineering services for the proposed replacement of a 24-inch-diameter concrete culvert (the McDonald Creek Culvert) that passes McDonald Creek below Eagle Harbor Drive Northeast in the City of Bainbridge Island, Washington. This proposal was requested by you on April 10, 2017.

Based on our discussions with you and the request for qualifications meeting we attended with you and the City of Bainbridge Island, we understand that the project consists of replacing the McDonald Creek Culvert beneath Eagle Harbor Drive Northeast, and construction of inlet and outlet wing walls associated with a replacement culvert. Some stream regrading may also be required as part of the project. It is our understanding that the City of Bainbridge Island prefers to replace the culvert using trenchless methods.

The McDonald Creek Culvert allows McDonald Creek to pass through a road fill prism construction for Eagle Harbor Drive Northeast. The culvert is located approximately 20 feet and 28 feet beneath the southwest edge and northeast edge of pavement of Eagle Harbor Drive Northeast, respectively.

GeoEngineers previously conducted preliminary biological surveys at the site as part of Island-Wide Deep Culvert Assessment project. As such we are familiar with the site, have a base knowledge of biological aspects of the creek and are well suited to contribute to this project.

#### **SCOPE OF SERVICES**

#### Task 1 - Biological/Geomorphology

#### Site visit and report

GeoEngineers will perform a site investigation both upstream and downstream of the existing culvert. Two staff scientists (a biologist and geomorphologist) will collect data on critical areas, and delineate the Ordinary High Water Mark (OHWM) and associated wetlands within 150 feet of the inlet and outlet of the culvert. We will also collect data on stream stability and sediment sizes by conducting a pebble count in appropriate locations within the stream channel.

- 1. Flag OHWM and wetland boundaries near both sides of the crossing for survey/base map preparation.
- 2. Document construction access and staging locations with regards to critical areas.
- 3. Potentially assess downstream fish habitat and the potential for project impacts to migrate.
- 4. Prepare a wetland and stream delineation report. The reporting will consist of a baseline critical areas assessment to include wetlands and streams on the subject property and a brief geomorphic discussion regarding observations made during the site investigation.
- 5. We will review and provide input on the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) checklist and permit documents. We will coordinate our findings with the design team and attend two project meetings to discuss potential project impacts.

#### **Biological Evaluation**

The purpose of a Biological Evaluation (BE) is to identify if a project or action will have an effect on aquatic or terrestrial species listed or proposed for listing under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). We are assuming the BE will lead to findings that the project would have a "may affect, not likely to adversely affect" listed species or critical habitat. This effect determination will require informal consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and/or National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and will be resolved with a letter of concurrence from each of the Services. Although highly unlikely, if the proposed action "may affect, likely to adversely affect" listed species or critical habitat, formal consultation with the Services must be initiated, which will require additional effort beyond the scope of this proposal. Special attention will be paid to the determination of effect, since this is the most important section of the BE and the one that will be most scrutinized by reviewers. We will keep you apprised of our preliminary findings and will discuss potential impacts with you so that any needed mitigation or conservation measures can be incorporated into the project.

A draft BE report will be provided to Reid Middleton and City of Bainbridge Island for review and comment. We will finalize the BE after appropriate revision based on comments. One round of edits by the reviewing services will be included in this scope of work. Any additional edits will require a contract amendment. Copies of the final report will be provided to the Reid Middleton and City of Bainbridge Island.



#### Task 2 - Trenchless Feasibility Assessment

- 1. General project management including correspondence, coordinate and manage the field investigation, public utility notification and scheduling of subcontractors and GeoEngineers' field staff, and Job Hazard Analysis and brief documents for field staff.
- 2. Review information regarding subsurface soil and groundwater at the site, including reports in our files, selected geologic maps, and other geotechnical engineering-related information.
- 3. Review Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) videos of the culvert to be provided by Reid Middleton.
- 4. Review culvert alignment and profile documents provided by Reid Middleton.
- 5. Subcontract with a traffic control specialist to provide a traffic control plan to be included with the City of Bainbridge Island's required right-of-way permit to conduct geotechnical explorations.
- 6. Prepare and submit a City of Bainbridge Island right-of-way permit to conduct drilled borings within Eagle Harbor Drive Northeast.
- Conduct a site visit to observe site conditions relative to potential trenchless replacement methods.
   This visit will be conducted by one of our trenchless specialists. We will mark proposed boring locations during this visit.
- 8. Explore subsurface soil and groundwater conditions at the site by means of four hollow stem auger borings. We will drill two borings along the culvert alignment and above the culvert to depths ranging between 12.5 and 20 feet below ground surface (bgs) to evaluate soil conditions directly above the culvert. We will drill two borings adjacent to the culvert to depths ranging between 30 and 40 feet bgs to characterize subsurface conditions adjacent to and at least 10 feet below the existing culvert. The borings will be backfilled as required by state law and surface disturbance minimized to the extent practical. Cuttings will be placed in drums and hauled off site for disposal.
- 9. Explore subsurface conditions at the culvert inlet and outlet by means of two hand auger borings to a maximum depth of 10 feet bgs.
- 10. Obtain samples at representative intervals from the explorations, observe groundwater conditions and maintain detailed logs in general accordance with ASTM International (ASTM) Standard Practices Test Method D 2488. Qualified staff from our office will observe and document field activities.
- 11. Perform laboratory tests on selected soil samples obtained from the explorations to evaluate pertinent engineering characteristics. Specific laboratory tests will depend on soil conditions encountered, but may include moisture-density tests, Atterberg limit tests, grain size analyses and percent fines tests.
- 12. Perform a trenchless feasibility evaluation for replacement of the culvert. Our evaluation will consider auger bore and pipe bursting as potential trenchless methods to replace the culvert.
- 13. Provide Reid Middleton with draft narrative summaries pertaining to trenchless feasibility to be inserted into the project report being prepared by Reid Middleton. We will not provide a stand-along trenchless feasibility report for this task.



#### Task 3 - Geotechnical Analysis and Reporting

- Complete geotechnical analysis for retaining walls, excavations and global stability for temporary cuts and wing walls.
- 2. Provide a geotechnical data report to characterize subsurface conditions along the alignment, including the following geotechnical components:
  - a. A general description of site topography, geology and subsurface conditions;
  - b. Potential impacts of existing subsurface conditions on the proposed project construction;
  - c. Excavation conditions and recommendations for shoring pressures;
  - d. Discussion of soil conditions relative to pipe bursting or auger bore methods depending on the chosen preferred trenchless option. Although we do not know which trenchless option may be chosen, we anticipate that our discussion may include reaction pressures and potential impacts to surrounding conditions from pipe bursting; and likely minimum casing size, tunnelmen's classification of soils, likely launching and receiving pit depths for an auger bore installation;
  - e. Recommendations for temporary excavation and temporary excavation protection, such as excavation sheeting and bracing;
  - f. Recommendations for retaining walls (wing walls associated with the culvert replacement) including passive and lateral earth pressures and foundation support; and
  - g. Discussion of global slope stability for temporary cuts and permanent cuts for wing walls.

**Items 1 & 2:** Notes from the April 19 meeting were approved as distributed; the Agenda was reviewed and approved.

**Item 3:** Norm Down spoke from a long acquaintance with development on Bainbridge, and expressed concern over the impact of subdivisions in the R-1 zone, saying that hemlock and Douglas fir especially are not comfortable with development.

**Item 4.A:** Mike reported that Staff are close to an agreement with Herrera on a schedule for the LID Phase II work; he made reference to a table describing tasks in four categories. The fourth of these ("Assist Planning," which by implication includes the Committee) makes reference to SMP Amendments, Vegetation Management, Critical Areas, plus "etc." Jon asked for the inclusion of Subdivision Design Standards in the list.

It is to be understood that Herrera's work will be completed in 2017. At the next meeting (5/17) or the first meeting in June we will see the details of the schedule and have an opportunity to coordinate our workplans.

**Item 4.B:** Jennifer presented a proposal to amend BIMC 18.15.010, establishing tree retention requirements for single family residential lots. In the Open Space Residential zones (R-0.4, R-1, & R-2), the norms refer to the extent of **tree canopy**, and in zones from R-2.9 and up, the norms refer to **tree units**, with 40 TU/Acre as the basis for calculations. For the OSR zones, the Committee preferred the "alternative option," which sets standards for tree canopy based on square footage of the lot, recognizing that many lots in R-0.4 are less than (and some may be greater than) 2.5 acres.

For example: on a lot that is greater than 100,000 sq ft, the extent of tree canopy to be retained would be 70%; on a lot size between 40,000 and 70,000 sq ft, the tree canopy retained would be 50%. However, if prior to development the tree cover on a lot is less than the standard, planting to meet the standard is not <u>required</u>. Mike Juneau pointed out that requiring the preservation of tree canopy will be problematic if it means that trees with limited long-term value, such as Scouler's willow and alder, cannot be removed and replaced.

To Jon's question about applying these standards to long and short plat subdivisions, Jennifer said that the requirements should be similar; the SFR regulations will establish a starting point.

Jennifer then asked what limits should apply if a lot is being cleared for an agricultural use, or if an existing farm is being expanded. At a minimum, LID and stormwater management regulations would apply, and critical areas are off limits, but the BIMC treats agriculture

(including gardening for one's own use) as a permitted use in all zones. Clearing forested land for farming, as was done in the old days after timber had been harvested, seemed objectionable to the Committee in the present day. Perhaps farming (with a farm plan approved by the Kitsap Conservation District) should be permitted only if the land had previously been used for farming and/or the trees are immature. Presumably, a cursory site assessment could determine if a lot is rendered unsuitable for farming due to shade from the trees on its perimeter or on an adjoining lot.

We also discussed the fact that City policies and public opinion favor the use of solar panels and building designs that require generous provisions for access to sunlight. Jennifer will work on language to provide some leeway.

**Item 4.C:** Jennifer spoke of the Committee's long-term "repeal / replace" project, BIMC 16.18 & 16.22 (Land Clearing & Vegetation Management), observing that the new chapter will be, in essence, a description of the processes of applying for and carrying out either a **minor** or a **major** clearing permit. We need to define the thresholds for distinguishing one from the other. Jon said that in addition, the chapter should include a list of activities that are allowed, even encouraged, without a permit.

**Item 5:** There were no closing comments by members of the public.

**Item 6:** Regarding the agenda for May 17, it is assumed that we will return to each of the items of Ongoing Business. Jon asked the Committee members to examine the **Community Forest Management Plan** that was completed in 2006, to see if (or how) it might be used in public outreach and as a foundation for the Code revisions we are working on.
